Peter proceeded to speak to those gathered in the house of Cornelius, saying: "In truth, I see that God shows no partiality. You know the word that he sent to the Israelites as he proclaimed peace through Jesus Christ, who is Lord of all, what has happened all over Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John preached, how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and power. doing good and healing all those oppressed by the devil, for God was with him"

Catechism Study for this week:

About Prayer: Descriptions of prayer are abundant throughout Christian history. "True prayer," wrote St. Augustine, "is nothing but love." Prayer should arise from the heart. "Prayer," said St. John Vianney, "is the inner bath of love into which the soul plunges itself. "Everyone of us needs half an hour of prayer each day," remarked St. Francis de Sales, "except when we are busy—then we need an hour." Definitions of prayer are important, but insufficient. There is a huge difference between knowing about prayer and praying. On this issue, the Rule of St. Benedict is clear, "If a man wants to pray, let him go and pray." St. John Damascene gave a classic definition of prayer: "Prayer is the raising of one's mind and heart to God or the requesting of good things from God", citing St. John Damascene. The Catechism clearly defines prayer as a "vital and personal relationship with the living and true God". Prayer is Christian "insofar as it is communion with Christ and a covenant relationship between God and man in Christ"

Adult Bible Study for this week:

About Faith in GOD: from 1st Letter of St John 3:22 "Beloved: We receive from (God) him whatever we ask, because we keep his commandments and do what pleases him. And his commandment is this: we should believe in the name of his Son, Jesus Christ, and love one another just as he commanded us. Those who keep his commandments remain in him, and he in them, and the way we know that he remains in us is from the Spirit whom he gave us."


