READY FOR BEING CALLED: Our Gospel tells us about being ready for when we are called by Jesus. The wedding customs of ancient Israel may seem strange to us. So would customs of our modern day which we are not familiar with. It was the practice of the time that the groom would go to the brides village and bring her to the wedding feast. This may have taken time since he may have to travel a great distance. So the attendants would have to be ready to welcome him and his bride, whether it was at night or in the morning. The lamps had to be ready if he came at night. Part of the attendants were not prepared with their lamps, so they did not go into the wedding. Are we ready when Jesus comes? I am talking about the end of our life. Have we had Jesus with us all during our life? Or are we waiting for the last moment? We have no idea when that will happen. We always need to be ready for our death, it could happen at any time. The lamp is the light of Christ in our soul. At our baptism we were filled with the light of Christ, at the Easter Vigil we renew that light. Have we kept that light burning bright or have we let the light go dim by not keeping the oil strong? Jesus is the Bride-groom of our soul are we ready to welcome him? Or is our lamp out of gas? We cannot go and buy oil and come back. We need to be ready no matter when He comes. We want to be welcomed to the eternal feast in heaven.
