**Raymond E Augustine** was a parishioner of St Valentine Polish National Catholic Church, Philadelphia, PA. We know from the records that the Augustine family lived at 4807 Melrose Street in St Valentine's immediate neighborhood. He had 2 older sisters and 2 younger brothers. Raymond was the son of Edward Augustine and Irene Augustine. His mother's family name was Koziembroski. Raymond served from Fort Dix, NJ and he is listed in the military records as A3c US Air Force Korea. Raymond died as a result of a C118 plane crash on July 13, 1956 - he was only 18 years old at the time of death. Raymond is buried at the Beverly National Military Cemetery in Beverly, NJ.
